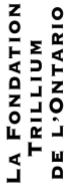
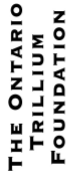

Working with Landowners to Conserve Habitat and the Environment

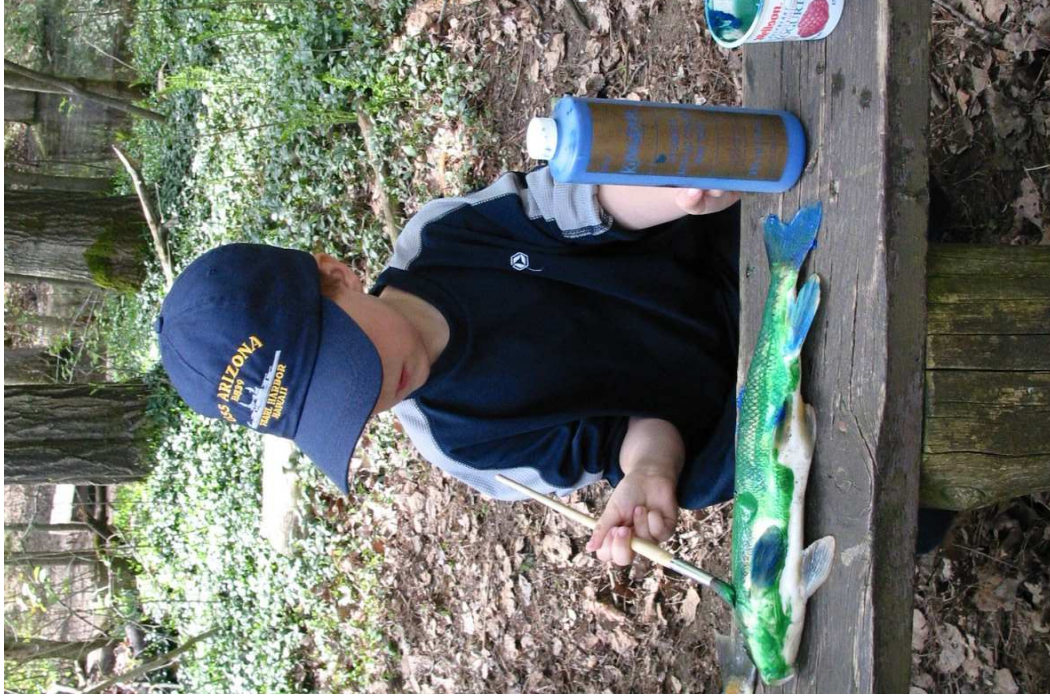


Laurie Lawson Outdoor Education Centre—Cobourg

The Centre was founded in 1968 and some 3,200 JK—Grade 7 children from the Kawartha Pine Ridge District School Board visit every year.

In 2003, the property was donated, by Dr. Mary Bedford-Jones, to the Land Trust ensuring that students will always have a place where they can learn about the natural environment.

The 100 acres of woodland, wetlands and trout streams is home to a wide variety of pond life, toads, frogs, snakes, squirrels, chipmunks, rabbits, deer, and foxes. There is a permanent classroom and a full time outdoor education instructor.

McEwen Property—Hope Township

In April 2008, the Nature Conservancy of Canada donated the McEwen Property to the Northumberland Land Trust.

Situated on the Oak Ridges Moraine this 100-acre property had been in the McEwen family for many years. It will now be protected, in perpetuity, from developers.

The property is a tract of rolling wooded kame forest and open fields, directly adjacent to the Ganaraska Forest. The habitats include meadows, Oak Pine Forest, White Cedar Coniferous Forest, a birch-poplar mixed swamp, a creek and a rich pond.



Conservation Easement

In the Fall of 2008, the Land Trust finalized their first Conservation Easement - 177 acres on a property in Cramahe.

Purchase/Donation

The part purchase, part donation of 52 acres of land in Alnwick/Haldimand was completed in January 2009. This property is on the Oak Ridges Moraine.
